

South Trounces North In Annual Classic at Hofstra

So far, as the season moves into the late stages of the year, the Rebel football team has had a respectable record. The team's overall record was 4-2.

Led by quarterback Ed Figueroa

and backs Sey Young, Bill Druckman, and Scott Losee, the team has garnered victories over Island Trees, Plainview, and the big one at Hofstra over Great Neck North. However, in the Plainview game, Figueroa was

ineligible because of academic requirements and coach Sal Serpe had to bring up Drew Southern from the junior varsity. Southern stepped in and did very well leading the team to a 26-14 triumph. One of South's scores was on a long pass play from Southern to Wayne Garr. Garr caught the ball twenty yards downfield and raced past the lone defender for a quick six. The Rebels totally dominated the game en route to their 4th victory.

There are only two other games on South's schedule, those against Plainview-Kennedy and MacArthur. If the Rebels come up victors in both these contests, they will have amassed the best football record in the school's history. Even if they don't win both of these games, the team will be satisfied with the year because of their triumph over North on the Astroturf at Hofstra. The 35-14 demolition of North's defenses was the result of a well-trained, well-planned attack and it avenged last year's defeat.

The team hopes for the best in its final two games. If they continue their winning ways, they will be 2nd in the division.

According to assistant coach Claude Bahrenburg, "The success of South's season is judged almost entirely on how well they do against North." Well, South couldn't have been more successful, as they destroyed North last Saturday night, under the lights of Hofstra.

Rebel running sensation Sey Young may have clinched a position on the All-League football team, as he galloped for 207 yards and four touchdowns. Sey's running partner Billy Druckman scored the first of South's five touchdowns.

The defense, led by linebackers Jeff Becker and Scott Losee, and lineman Claude Stauffer, Kurt Seidman and Neil Singleton, forced North to fumble five times. The Blazers were held scoreless for the first three quarters. In fact, North did not score until

after South's second squad, spearheaded by Maurice Garfield and Alan McElfresh, went into the game.

The 33-14 victory not only made up for last year's humiliating loss to North, but also puts South in a tie for third place in the division. This Saturday South plays Clarke, and the Rebels have a chance to move into second place.

Students, faculty and nostalgic alumni traveled in the familiar parade to Hofstra University Saturday night for the annual spectacle known as the North-South football game.

The highly celebrated event brings forth feelings of school spirit that each student has underneath his cynical frame. This year, the North-South game prompted a plethora of school spirit. Activity began as early as 3:30 p.m. with a pre-game procession down Middle Neck Rd. Then it was on to Hofstra where numerous posters dotted the drab concrete grandstands and gave evidence that something out of the ordinary was about to transpire. The abundant color and excitement made this year's pre-game activities a rare and joyous event.

The game started promptly at 8 p.m. Suffice it to say that that

this was not one of our better days. North lost to South by the score of 33-14.

Persistent turnovers spelled doom for the Blazers. They fumbled in the first quarter to set up a South score and were generally unable to sustain any drive during the first half of play. South put 19 points on the board in the second quarter. The Rebels, able to gain excellent field position as a result of North's fumbles, rallied behind Senior Scy Young to take a 26 point lead at the end of the first half.

Young, the outstanding player of the night, powered his way through the Blazer defensive line for four touchdowns. He gained over 200 yards rushing.

The reliable Victor Bush scored North's first touchdown in the fourth quarter. Bush received a short pass from quarterback Bob Jason and broke several tackles for the touchdown. Dennis

Reid caught a three-yard pass from Jason for the second score minutes later.

Several North players blamed the astro-turf of Hofstra's field for problems on offense. Senior fullback Jeff Satnick explained that the backs move faster on the astro-turf. This threw off the timing of the quarterback on handoff plays, said Satnick. The blocking broke down as a result of the bad timing and North's offense was totally disorganized for most of the game.

The astro-turf was certainly no problem for Scy Young or the rest of the Great Neck South squad. The Rebels did not attempt a forward pass in the game and nevertheless wound up with the tremendous victory.

Win or lose, the North-South football game is one of those special affairs which often become part of a student's lingering memories.

FOOTBALL

Great Neck South beat Plainview, 26-14, as Scy Young ran for two touchdowns and threw for a third.

Young started South's scoring, as he smashed across the goal line from 4 yards out, early in the second quarter. The next Rebel tally came on a 48-yard run by Scott Losee. South's third touchdown of the quarter was a result of what is so far the most exciting play of South's season. Near the end of the first half, with Great Neck on their own 38 yard line, running back Young started what was apparently a sweep to the right. However, just as Young approached the line of scrimmage, he stopped and threw upfield to South's captain, Wayne Garr. Garr trotted unmolested into the end zone, to give Great Neck a 20-8 halftime lead.

There was no more scoring until the fourth quarter, when Plainview's Rich Owen scored

his second touchdown of the game to cut South's lead to 6 points. But, with less than three minutes remaining in the game, Young tallied on a 57-yard run to put the game out of reach. Steve Glasco, the Rebel's kicker, despite heavy winds, was able to kick two extra points.

Because South had lost two of its starters, two sophomores, quarterback Drew Southard and running back Sandy McNichol, started. Both played brilliantly as they got their first taste of varsity play. South's defense was led by a trio of seniors—linebackers Greg Bonara and Roger Beggelman and lineman Kurt Seidman. Thanks mainly to them and to Scy Young, South is now tied for second place in their division.
